Postgraduate Financial Assistance Fund 2022/23 Report

The University's Financial Assistance Committee provides a report following each academic year outlining the financial assistance provided to postgraduate students for the previous academic year. The following data is for the academic year 2022/23.

Please note that numbers of 3 and below are suppressed (<3) in order that individual students cannot be identified.

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1. Overview of the Fund

The Postgraduate Financial Assistance Fund provides financial assistance to postgraduate students in unforeseen financial need. The awards are intended to support students who would otherwise be unable to complete their research or study.

In 2022/23, the Fund provided awards of up to £3,500 to assist students with their living costs. The maximum award was exceptionally increased from £2,000 to £3,500 to acknowledge the impact of the Cost of Living crisis on students.

Postgraduate research (PGR) students who were impacted by the Covid-19 pandemic, experiencing financial difficulties, and had to extend their studies could receive exceptional awards of up to £5,700.

Figure 2a. Bar chart to show the breakdown of applications received by term in 2022/23.




Figure 2b. Table to show the breakdown of applications received by term in 2022/23.

Figure 3a. Bar chart to show the breakdown of the values of awards in 2022/23.




Figure 3b. Table to show the breakdown of the values of awards in 2022/23.

Figure 4a. Bar chart to show breakdown of applications by College in 2022/23.1




Figure 4b. Table to show breakdown of applications by College in 2022/23.

Figure 5a. Bar chart to show breakdown of applications by fee status in 2022/232.




Figure 5b. Table to show breakdown of applications by fee status in 2022/23.

Figure 6a. Bar chart to show breakdown of applications by course in 2022/23.




Figure 6b. Table to show breakdown of applications by course in 2022/23.

7. Reason for financial difficulties (successful applications)

The main reasons for the financial difficulties experienced by students with a successful application in 2022/23 were the following:

- Covid-19 pandemic
- Cost of Living crisis
- Family circumstances, for example, a bereavement
- Poor health

8. Reasoning behind unsuccessful applications

169 applications were unsuccessful with applications being declined due to not meeting the eligibility criteria of the Fund, as published on the webpages available on the Cambridge Students website.

The main reasons include the following:

- The student was eligible to apply for additional funding from their funding sponsor, the Cambridge Trust.
- The student was in receipt of full funding from a funding sponsor.
- The student had declared savings in their application form which were sufficient enough to meet their financial shortfall.
- The student indicated a high financial shortfall which the maximum award could not meet.
 These students were advised to intermit from their studies and develop a viable funding plan.
- The student's circumstances which led to financial difficulties were not unforeseen.
